SCOPE OF DISCUSSION

1. How does this group determine if a boundary dispute has been formally brought?
 2. Once a boundary dispute has been formally brought, what process will this group follow in holding a meeting with the affected neighborhoods?
 3. What is this group's responsibility to the residents of the neighborhoods it serves?
What are some of the considerations to be made in light of this responsibility?

ACTION

EPNO will employ survey monkey to further refine the discussion about how a boundary dispute is formally brought to this group.

ONI PERSPECTIVE OFFERED BY PAUL LEISTNER

Historically there has been a strong preference to work through disputes at the neighborhood level as a means of strengthening communities. This group may interpret the ONI guidelines narrowly to require nothing more than a meeting of the EPNAs

Chairs Group and the affected neighborhood associations. However, a broader reading -- one which calls for further engagement at the district coalition board level -- would be in keeping with ONI's preference for resolving boundary disputes at the neighborhood and district coalition level.

DISCUSSION SUMMARY

In the following summary of this group's discussion, the **blue text** indicates decisions made and **purple text** reflect areas of consensus the chairs, though no decision was reached.

1) General

Chairs expressed that:

- A. boundary disputes are significant matters which directly affect the community, both its residents and businesses and therefore should be carefully evaluated by this group;
- B. resources (volunteer time and money) are limited and therefore the time spent addressing boundary disputes should be limited.

A majority of the chairs do not want to continue the discussion at a subsequent meeting.

RECOMMEND Assigning a task force to further refine the group's process for addressing boundary disputes. This would be a continuation of the work already completed at the January and February meetings. The task force would prepare and present a proposal to this group at a subsequent meeting.

2) Formal Submission of a Boundary Dispute Before The EPNAs Chairs Group

The Chairs expressed that:

1. A boundary dispute is formally brought to this group when there is a written communication in an email or letter form that:
 - a. contains an adequate description of the dispute,
 - i. including a clear description of the area in question (.e.g, a map)
 - ii. the number of households in the area in question
 - iii. identifies the businesses in the area in question
 - iv. provides a history of the existing boundary and
 - v. summarizes the history that causes the area to be in question
 - b. contains evidence of a formal resolution by the neighborhood association board bringing the dispute

c. is received by the affected neighborhood association boards

Emphasis among the members is on having adequate information to ensure that a proposed boundary change is official, adequately described and properly communicated.

AND

2. the affected neighborhood associations have had an opportunity to respond.
 - i. to acknowledge the receipt of the communication and indicate when a substantive response will be made
 - ii. to explain the neighborhood's position *or*
 - iii. to explain why the board is unable to respond

One approach is to allow a response to be made through the normal course of the NAs process. (This would mean, for example, that a proposal must be presented at an annual meeting of the general membership, in which case a response may take a year or more.) Care should be taken that the process could be stalled for an unreasonable period, or even indefinitely. **RECOMMEND** allowing 30 days from the time of receipt of the communication to respond in writing to EPNO and the affected NAs with at a minimum an explanation of why the NA board is unable to respond in substance to the proposed change. This time limit would help to ensure that, absent agreement by the NAs to delay the 6 month deadline, the matter would be brought to ONI for a decision within 6 months.

AND

3. the neighborhood association has attempted to resolve the dispute.

Note that chairs were split 50/50 on whether an attempt to resolve the dispute should be required as a threshold matter.

3) The Process the Chairs Group will follow in addressing the dispute.

The chairs identified some considerations and expressed individual views as follows:

1. Volunteer time is limited and valuable. Volunteer time spent on a boundary dispute should be limited.
2. Resources are limited. Who will bear the expenses incurred through this process?
3. A boundary dispute is often emotionally charged among the affected neighborhood associations. The involvement of this group may bring objectivity that may help move the neighborhoods forward.
4. The group's time is limited and valuable. Holding a special meeting is an added burden that the group members cannot shoulder.

5. A boundary dispute is a serious matter. This group should take this seriously. A rush to judgment would be improper. The chairs should make sure they know the facts.
6. The Chairs Group may choose to meet with the neighborhoods separately or together. What factors are at play in this decision?
7. Finality is important. What can the group do to ensure that a boundary is settled and does not become a recurring issue.

RECOMMEND: Attached is a DRAFT Dispute Resolution Process. The draft is intended as a starting point and reflects the ideas and values expressed at the EPNAs Chairs Group discussions at the January and February meetings.

4) Each NA Board's Responsibility To Its General Membership and the Neighborhood Residents.

The chairs expressed that:

1. An NA board is limited in its ability to respond to a dispute, by its obligations to its members. The NA board cannot act unilaterally without its approval of its actions by the general membership.
2. The Neighborhood Associations can rely on the 6 month time period triggered by a formally brought dispute. In this way, the board can protect the integrity of the process.
3. How will we address language barriers? Many residents speak languages other than English. How do we ensure that our communication reaches those residents?
4. Notice to the affected neighborhood association's general membership is important. How will this happen and at whose expense?

Emphasis is on the integrity of the relationship between the neighborhood association boards and the general membership and a question about how resources will be allocated for any notifications that are needed. **RECOMMEND** before March meeting, boards review bylaws and seek clarification as needed from EPNO regarding the extent to which NA board may respond to a boundary dispute while meeting its obligations to the general membership. **RECOMMEND** obtaining clarification from EPNO regarding how to notify residents and businesses within the area in question.

Boundary Dispute Policy Resolution Process

Policy Statement

The East Portland Neighborhood Association Chairs Group (Group) recognizes that neighborhood boundaries are significant. Changes to existing boundaries and areas of unsettlement have an impact on the community. Resolving disputes over boundaries may involve financial costs and significant time commitments from Neighborhood Associations and this Group.

Accordingly, it will be the policy of this Group to encourage affected NAs to work together to resolve boundary disputes whenever possible and, once resolved, treat the matter as settled. NAs that reach an agreement about an unsettled boundary or proposed change will inform this Group, and the directors of EPNO and ONI of the change within 30 days of the agreement.

This Boundary Dispute Resolution Process has been prepared in accordance with this policy and the ONI guidelines for resolving boundary disputes.

Boundary Dispute Resolution Process

1) If the NAs are unable to reach an agreement, a boundary dispute may be initiated by written submission to this Group requesting that this Group hold a meeting with the affected NAs to address the dispute ("Notice of Dispute"). The Notice of Dispute will be submitted to this Board with copies sent electronically to the executive committees of the affected NAs, and the directors at EPNO and ONI.

The submission must include:

- a. an adequate description of the dispute;
 - b. a clear description of the area in question (e.g, a map);
 - c. the number of households in the area in question;
 - d. identification of the businesses in the area in question;
 - e. a history of the existing boundary;
 - f. reasons that this dispute is timely;
 - g. evidence of a formal resolution by the neighborhood association board bringing the dispute.
 - h. is received by the affected neighborhood association boards
- 2) The affected NAs will have 30 days to acknowledge the Notice of Dispute and will
- a. indicate when a substantive response will be made
 - b. explain the NA's position **or**
 - c. to explain why the board is unable to respond.

The 6 month timeline for the boundary dispute resolution process under ONI's Standards begins upon receipt of the Notice of Dispute by EPNO.

- 3) Upon receipt of a Notice of Dispute, the Group will hold a meeting with the affected NAs, either separately or together.
 - a. The intent of the meeting is to explore possible avenues for an agreement by the affected NAs – not for Group to make a decision. Productive areas of conversation might include:
 - i. Presentations by a representative of each NA regarding the history of the affected area, the issues involved, and what is most important to the NA about the connection between the affected area and the NA
 - ii. Clarifying questions by the Group (and perhaps EPNO/ONI staff or others) to better understand each NA's interests
 - iii. Exploration of avenues of resolution already tried
 - iv. Ideas for resolving the dispute that might meet the underlying needs of both NA's
 - v. Ideas for another process both NAs might agree on for resolving the dispute
 - vi. Caucus with the Group and each NA separately and/or time for each NA to meet privately.
 - vii. Presentation by each NA of the process, including timelines, it will follow for presenting any agreements reached in this meeting to its organization for consideration and/or confirmation.
 - viii. A discussion of next steps for the NAs prior to engaging with ONI.
 - b. The date and time of the meeting will be set by the Group.
 - c. Each board will send a quorum of its board members.
 - d. East Portland Neighborhood Association Chairs Group will facilitate the meeting or invite an outside facilitator.
 - e. Each NA board will choose up to 4 representatives to speak for the NA in the process. The intent is to keep the process manageable so that there can be a productive conversation. The meeting will be open to the public for observers, but the Group will determine whether all community members will participate or only the EPNA Chairs, the 4 representatives from each NA, and possibly representatives from EPNO staff and/or ONI.
- 4) The NAs will have an opportunity to present any agreement or other results of this meeting to its organization for confirmation and/or consideration within the time frames agreed upon.
- 5) In no agreement is reached, the NAs and the Group may continue to discuss and explore alternatives for resolving the dispute.
- 6) After 6 months, if the dispute remains unresolved, an affected NA may bring the matter directly to ONI for resolution in accordance with the ONI guidelines.

Report to the East Portland Neighborhood Associations – Chairs Group:

David Hampsten, a Hazelwood NA Board member, is the East Portland representative to the Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) Budget Advisory Committee.

This report is an analysis of the transportation budget for East Portland, listing known upcoming projects, as well as a project breakdown by neighborhood.

Background:

Over the next three summers, East Portland will be receiving at least \$25,322,854 in transportation infrastructure improvements, with some additional state funding that hasn't yet been officially authorized. Of this amount, about \$10 million are for projects already authorized years ago, while the remaining \$15 million are for new projects, including \$8 million for new sidewalks. For the purposes of this report, I'm dividing the new and upcoming East Portland transportation infrastructure projects by fiscal year (July 1 to June 30th of the following year), rather than the calendar year, the construction year (April through October), or the Federal fiscal year (October 1st – September 30th). Any savings on our projects will be used to fund the next tier of projects in East Portland. The "T", as in T00083, refers to a PBOT project tracking system.

Between now and June 30th 2012, several new projects will be started, including preliminary planning and outreach, in East Portland, and an LID finished up:

The "\$8 Mil S/W" is the list of projects funded by deferring money from the Sellwood Bridge project towards one-time only funding for sidewalks in East Portland & Southwest Portland, for \$16 million total. For 2011-2012, we get \$2,437,000 in City sidewalk funding for projects in East Portland, while the remaining \$3,477,715 comes from other revenue sources, including City funds. In addition, there are three bikeway projects nearing completion: SE Bush Street from 104th to 130th; SE 100th Ave from Springwater to Bush; and the 80s bikeway, from SE Division to Flavel; as well as several bike projects getting started, including the \$272,000 4M bikeway on SE Mill,

Market, Main, & Millmain. Several pedestrian islands and intersection improvements will also be implemented as part of adjacent sidewalk projects.

For the period of **July 1st 2012 through June 30th 2013**, the following projects are funded, with \$5,463,000 of the \$8 million in City sidewalk funding, the remaining from other sources:

In addition, several projects that are receiving ODOT & Metro flex funds will also be started, including infill sidewalks, bus stop improvements, and pedestrian islands along the whole length of SE Division from I-205 to the City line at 174th Ave, at a cost of roughly \$2,000,000; an on-street parking study for future buffered bike lanes on parts of Division & 122nd; \$20,000 in buffered bike lanes on NE Glisan from 148th to 162nd; the new \$1,350,000 130s bikeway; the new \$460,000 NE Oregon-Pacific Bikeway; bike & park facilities at the Gateway Transit Center (\$400,000) and at the Division & Holgate MAX stations (\$100,000 each); and bike parking racks and corrals at a variety of locations around East Portland. In addition, there will be continuing construction of pedestrian islands and intersection improvements at many locations throughout East Portland, as described in the East Portland In Motion report.

Most of these are funded from Federal non-City sources. The \$8 million sidewalk program will end, with the Division Street projects winding up by October 2014. However, the bikeway program will continue, with the 130s and Oregon-Pacific routes being completed; buffered bike lanes on Division striped; regular bike lanes on SE 102nd/Cherry Blossom/112th; and new bike greenways started along NE Sacramento

and the 150s route; and several additional pedestrian islands built. Metro will also start their planning and outreach for the Scooter Mountain trail in Pleasant Valley.

I've made lists for the **Neighborhood Projects**, which are based upon whether a project is **in** or **adjacent to** a neighborhood association. On these lists, all costs are total costs, over the two to three year construction period. Most projects go across neighborhood boundaries, so the figures stated are for the full project costs, and not necessarily for the neighborhood portion of the costs. A missing "T" number means that PBOT is still waiting for some likely ODOT money before they assign a project number for it, but that the City is still committed to building it, or else it is part of a bikeway/greenway project. Most of the projects will be finished by October 2013.

In keeping with our commitment to provide the PDX CAC with updates on the airport, we wanted to let you know that the Port will be thinning some trees in the median on Airport Way next week. Most of the trees are cedars on Airport Way east of 82nd, with a few trees west of 82nd Ave. This is being done primarily to improve the health of the Airport Way landscaping, but it will also have the secondary benefit of bringing our tree plantings closer to alignment with landscaping standards in the PDX Wildlife Hazard Management Plan. Removal of the trees will be done in a manner that maintains the visual screening effect; we believe this will not cause a significant change to the current look of the landscaping. The trees that are being removed will be recycled as cedar mulch and chips in landscaping on Port property. We anticipate the work will begin next week and will take two to three weeks to complete. Similar thinning is anticipated on airport property during the next few years in an effort to continue to promote overall tree health, and align with landscaping standards. Please let me know if you have questions about this activity, our upcoming meeting, or other topics.

Many East Portland neighborhoods are watching its tree canopy disappear. How can the Port's landscaping system support those neighborhoods and business district's landscaping efforts to provide a seamless visual experience from the airport.

I wanted to follow up a bit on your comments regarding our Airport Way Tree Thinning. The trees being removed are in various states of health; some are compromised in terms of root issues, stunted size or other problems. The tree thinning is being done mainly to provide for the future health of the remaining trees.

I wasn't sure from your email what you were suggesting for East Portland, but do want you to know that we have donated \$75,000 to Friends of Trees over the last five years to enhance the urban tree canopy. In fact, one of our Environmental Objectives and Targets addresses that. The language of the annual Objective and Target is: *Extend partnership with Friends of Trees by sponsoring and participating in tree plantings in neighborhoods adjacent to or near Port facilities to help offset impacts from Port operations. This initiative recognizes that the Port's operational activities do have some unavoidable impacts on the environment including urban tree cover in certain areas.* Thanks for your thoughtful comments Alesia, and let me know if you have more questions or comments.
