PROPOSED DRAFT LETTER

To PDC

From EPNO Chairs

Dear .....

The East Portland area includes three Portland Development Commission managed Urban Renewal Areas.

Lents (which includes significant portions of 3 EPNO Neighborhood Associations)  
Established in 1998  
2, 846.3 acres in size  
Expires in June, of 2020

Gateway (which significantly involves one of our EPNO Neighborhood Associations)  
Established in 2001  
658.5 acres in size  
Expires in June, of 2022

Airport Way (some impact on two of our EPNO Neighborhood Associations)  
Established in 1986  
1,841.4 acres in size  
Expired May of 2011

This makes the urban renewal districts in East Portland have special impact on both the present and the future of our area, since these efforts have accumulated debt to be repaid after the investments have been made by PDC. That accumulated debt will be paid by taxpayers in those districts as well as deferred costs which will need to be paid for patrons of other taxing districts who have been limited by the frozen assessment base. When the URA expires, the debt continues until it is fully repaid, whether or not the expected community value is delivered.

The Urban Renewal Districts in East Portland make up 3 of the 11 Urban Renewal Districts in the City of Portland and account for more than 43% of the total acreage in all the URAs within the City. We need to know more about them now in order to assess their permanent value of this method of investing in some of the needs of our area.

The Portland Development Commission is currently considered the Economic Development agency for the City of Portland. Reviewing the information on the PDC website, it is difficult to see how the East Portland Urban Renewal Districts adequately address long term economic development for East Portland residents, whether they live in the districts or are simply close to them in other area taxing districts.



We request a written report on how the 2012 debt payment of \$110,961,667 (as reported by the Multnomah County Tax Supervision Report) reflects East Portland URA debt payments and what permanent employment (by type and source) has been created by the investment of URA funds in each of the East Portland URA Districts since they were formed.

We also ask that this information be provided to our EPNO Chairs group so we can begin the development of a priority setting process which better reflects community interests, existing employer job opportunities, and local business needs. The discussion would involve the PDC advisory committees for the districts but also involve many other public voices that are apparently not currently at the table.

Note: The Lents Urban Renewal district significantly impacts residents in three Neighborhood Associations. Due to that fact, we would like to have the information about investments broken down for each of those Neighborhood Association areas; ie, Pleasant Valley Neighborhood Association, Lents Neighborhood Association, and Powellhurst-Gilbert Neighborhood Association.

We appreciate your response to our request and look forward to working with you in the very near future.

## **Suggestions for the boundary dispute process**

### **Suggested Public Involvement Process**

Mail postcards to all addresses in the disputed area asking them to participate in a poll concerning their neighborhood association.

Prepare web, mail, and/or phone poll for respondents with 5 or 6 questions.

Language on the postcard, poll, and poll questions would be designed to get response from those familiar with the neighborhood associations. A Committee made up of equal numbers of representatives from each neighborhood association, and at least one to as many members of the Chairs Group that wish to participate, would develop the exact language of the postcard and poll.

Residents would be given two weeks to respond to the poll.

The results of the poll would be used as information for the discussion at the meeting(s).

### **Questions about the meeting with the two neighborhood associations**

1. Do you want to meet with the neighborhood associations together or separately?
2. Who will facilitate the meeting(s)?
3. Who will be allowed to participate at the meeting(s)?
4. When will the meeting(s) be?

Boundary Dispute Policy Resolution Process  
Adopted March 7, 2012

## **Policy Statement**

The East Portland Neighborhood Association Chairs Group (Group) recognizes that neighborhood boundaries are significant. Changes to existing boundaries and areas of unsettlement have an impact on the community. Resolving disputes over boundaries may involve financial costs and significant time commitments from Neighborhood Associations and this Group.

Accordingly, it will be the policy of this Group to encourage affected NAs to work together to resolve boundary disputes whenever possible and, once resolved, treat the matter as settled. NAs that reach an agreement about an unsettled boundary or proposed change will inform this Group, and the directors of EPNO and ONI of the change within 30 days of the agreement.

This Boundary Dispute Resolution Process has been prepared in accordance with this policy and the ONI guidelines for resolving boundary disputes.

## **Boundary Dispute Resolution Process**

1) If the NAs are unable to reach an agreement, a boundary dispute may be initiated by written submission to this Group requesting that this Group hold a meeting with the affected NAs to address the dispute ("Notice of Dispute"). The Notice of Dispute will be submitted to this Group with copies sent electronically to the executive committees of the affected NAs, and the directors at EPNO and ONI.

The submission must include:

- a. an adequate description of the dispute;
  - b. a clear description of the area in question (e.g, a map);
  - c. the number of households in the area in question;
  - d. identification of the businesses in the area in question;
  - e. a history of the existing boundary;
  - f. reasons that this dispute is timely;
  - g. evidence of a formal resolution by the neighborhood association board bringing the dispute.
  - h. is received by the affected neighborhood association boards
- 2) The affected NAs will have 30 days to acknowledge the Notice of Dispute and will
- a. indicate when a substantive response will be made
  - b. explain the NA's position **or**
  - c. to explain why the board is unable to respond.
- 3) The 6 month timeline for the boundary dispute resolution process under ONI's Standards begins upon receipt of the Notice of Dispute by EPNO.

- 4) The Chairs Group shall develop a public involvement process for engagement of residents and businesses in the disputed area.
- 5) Upon receipt of a Notice of Dispute, the Group will hold a meeting with the affected NAs, either separately or together.
  - a. The intent of the meeting(s) is to explore possible avenues for an agreement by the affected NAs – not for Group to make a decision. Productive areas of conversation might include:
    - i. Presentations by a representative of each NA regarding the history of the affected area, the issues involved, and what is most important to the NA about the connection between the affected area and the NA
    - ii. Clarifying questions by the Group (and perhaps EPNO/ONI staff or others) to better understand each NA's interests
    - iii. Exploration of avenues of resolution already tried
    - iv. Ideas for resolving the dispute that might meet the underlying needs of both NA's
    - v. Ideas for another process both NAs might agree on for resolving the dispute
    - vi. Caucus with the Group and each NA separately and/or time for each NA to meet privately.
    - vii. Presentation by each NA of the process, including timelines, it will follow for presenting any agreements reached in this meeting to its organization for consideration and/or confirmation.
    - viii. A discussion of next steps for the NAs prior to engaging with ONI.
  - b. The date and time of the meeting(s) will be set by the Group.
  - c. Each board will send a quorum of its board members.
  - d. East Portland Neighborhood Association Chairs Group will facilitate the meeting or invite an outside facilitator.
  - e. Each NA board will choose up to 4 representatives to speak for the NA in the process. The intent is to keep the process manageable so that there can be a productive conversation. The meeting will be open to the public for observers, but the Group will determine whether all community members will participate or only the EPNA Chairs, the 4 representatives from each NA, and possibly representatives from EPNO staff and/or ONI.
- 6) The NAs will have an opportunity to present any agreement or other results of this meeting to its organization for confirmation and/or consideration within the time frames agreed upon.
- 7) If no agreement is reached, the NAs and the Group may continue to discuss and explore alternatives for resolving the dispute.
- 8) After 6 months, if the dispute remains unresolved, an affected NA may bring the matter directly to ONI for resolution in accordance with the ONI guidelines.

The Lents Neighborhood Association general membership approved the "principles of discussion" listed below at the April 24, 2012 meeting.

These **do not** override the resolution made at LNA's March meeting:

"The LNA opposes any change to neighborhood boundaries until we have adequate public involvement that satisfies the LNA membership."

## **Statement of Principles for Overlap**

### **1. The public has not spoken.**

There is nothing in the PGNA submission to indicate that the residents of the affected area have requested this change. The Lents Neighborhood Association finds it essential that the public is engaged in any decision about the neighborhood association boundaries. If the overlap is to be eliminated, both neighborhoods should agree to abide by the will of the residents and business owners in the overlap area.

### **2. There was no valid agreement to give up the overlap.**

The Lents Neighborhood Association had no authority to change the boundaries of its neighborhood coalition, which the purported agreement of 1990 would have done. The membership was no more authorized to change its boundaries than the Portland City Council is authorized to move the Multnomah County line. Accordingly, any agreement made at the time was invalid. (See attachment, letter from Nick Sauvie.)

### **3. 21 years have elapsed since the invalid agreement was made.**

In that time, thousands of people have moved to both neighborhoods, investing millions of dollars into property. The nature of the communities have changed. Furthermore, the purported agreement happened during a time of great strife and hostility in the neighborhoods, making it difficult to argue the decision was made on a rational basis.

### **4. The Lents Neighborhood Association boundaries have been in place for nearly 45 years.**

We can trace the genesis of our boundaries to fliers from the late 1960s, showing the neighborhood boundary as roughly a rectangle bordered by 82nd, Powell, 111th/112th and the southern city limits. These are simple for people to understand.

### **5. There is no harm in maintaining the overlap.**

The submission from PGNA does not explain what harm is caused by Ed Benedict Park being in two neighborhood associations, nor does it explain how the residents of the overlap are disserved by being eligible for membership in two associations. The area in question is *already* a part of the Powellhurst-Gilbert Neighborhood Association, a neighborhood association which has already demonstrated that it has no problem with having an overlap (which it maintains with the Pleasant Valley Neighborhood Association as well).

### **6. PGNA has not approached the LNA about this issue directly.**

While the LNA Chair has approached the general membership of the PGNA to inquire as to whether the purported boundary dispute had gone through a democratic process, PGNA, at no point in 2011, directly asked the LNA chair or membership whether this was an issue it wanted to address. Rather than tell EPNO staff that PGNA desired to "resolve" the overlap, this should have been first approached through a civil discussion with the LNA membership. This has yet to happen.

I thought I had made this request clear to you on previous occasions, but this is apparently not the case. I continue to be annoyed at your insistence on taking inappropriate, unilateral actions.

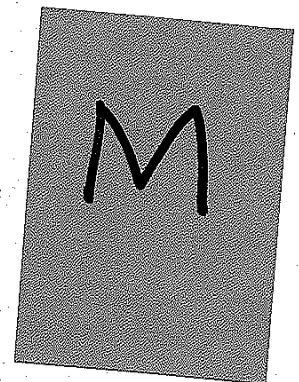
For your information, the Lents Neighborhood Association has not changed its boundaries. They remain 82nd on the west, 112th on the east, Powell on the north and the Portland city limits on the south. These boundaries have been established for at least fifteen years. As far as I know, Lents has no intention of changing its boundaries at any time in the near future. As I have stated to you the Lents Neighborhood Association folks and I are willing to take part in a rational discussion about boundary changes, overlapping boundaries, creation of new neighborhood associations, etc.

Any change in the Lents and Powellhurst-Gilbert boundaries impacts the DCB boundaries of both Southeast Uplift and East Portland, making them appropriate matters for our DCB Boards. The Southeast Uplift Board is not aware of, nor has approved, any changes in the Southeast Uplift boundaries.

I am notifying DNA of the current Southeast Uplift/Lents boundaries. I am requesting that DNA mediate this issue.
